We have introduced a **colour code** to the featured Activities so that you can try to match them to **people's abilities**, **interests and level of participation**.

+Blue

Blue – High cognitive skills- able to complete quizzes, puzzles and crosswords unaided.



Red – Living with early – mid stage Dementia. Interested in the 'doing' rather than the end result. Can follow simple instructions.



Orange – Living with mid-late stage Dementia. Able to work one to one to complete short activities



Green – Living with late stage dementia, highly dependent. Probably not aware of their surroundings. Sensory stimulation is needed to raise their self awareness, only stimulate 1 sense at a time as too much can be distressing or confusing for the person

+Craft – **Pinking Shear Bunting**

What you need

- Material
- Pinking shears (the blades are saw-toothed instead of straight. They leave a zigzag pattern instead of a straight edge)
- Card
- Length of ribbon

What you do:

- Make your card template bunting can be any shape you like really, typically it is triangular.
- Lay the material out and using the pinking shears cut out the shape
- Staple the cut out shapes onto the ribbon

Now your bunting is ready to hang!

See the photograph right, you could change the material to old comics and give your bunting the vintage feel.

+Recipe - Easy Cupcakes

What you need

For the cupcakes:

- 170g (6oz) butter or margarine
- 170g (6oz) sugar
- 3 eggs
- 170g (6oz) self-raising flour

For the butter icing:

- 170g (6oz) icing sugar
- 1 tablespoon golden syrup
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 55g (2oz) butter

What you do:

- Pre heat oven to 180c (gas mark 4)
- Cream together margarine and sugar until light and fluffy. Add the eggs one at a time, beating continuously. Sift in flour and mix gently.
- Spoon mixture into prepared cupcake cases Bake for 20 minutes until golden brown. Cool on a wire rack.
- For a smooth icing, sieve icing sugar into a bowl. Heat syrup, milk and butter in a saucepan and add to the sugar. Mix together, until well combined, allow to cool then pipe onto your cupcakes.

+Recipe – **Watercress and lobster sandwiches,**a party snack fit for a Queen



Makes 16

Buy the best white sandwich bread you can for these rich and extravagant little sandwiches, fit for monarchs and their subjects alike. These can also be served as open sandwiches.

What you need

- 8 slices of white bread cut into four pieces
- Softened butter

For the filling

 2 lobsters, ready cooked, the meat from the body and claws cut in small slices

- The leafy end of 2 bunches of watercress, chopped
- 300g mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon brandy
- 1 level tablespoon tomato purée
- 1 large pinch cayenne pepper

What you do:

- Preheat the oven to 220C/gas mark 7. Butter both sides of the bread lightly, place on a baking sheet and bake for about five minutes or until golden brown. Remove from the oven and allow to cool.
- Combine all the filling ingredients, and season to taste with salt and freshly ground black pepper.
- Put about one tablespoon between two pieces of toasted bread and serve.









+Recipe – Jubilee Cake

What you need

- 6oz softened butter
- 6oz caster sugar
- 6oz self raising flower
- 3 beaten eggs
- 3-4 tablespoons strawberry jam
- 2 cups of vanilla cream cheese frosting
- Fresh halved strawberries for decoration

What you do:

- Line and grease 2 round (18 cm) cake tins
- Beat the butter and eggs together until pale and fluffy. Add the eggs a little at a time, beating well after each addition.
- Fold the flour in two batches and when combined divide the mix between the tins. Level the top and bake at 190c (375f) gas mark 5 for 20 minutes.
 Test with a skewer in the centre – if it comes out clean the cake is cooked.
 Turn out onto a wire rack and cool.
- When cool sandwich the cakes together with the jam and decorate the top with swirls of frosting. Spread a thin layer of frosting on sides of cake and decorate with halved strawberries and cake bunting!

+Recipe – Let's party! Individual Queen of Puddings

Royal dessert: Individual Queen of Puddings - Makes 6

What you need

- 225ml (8fl oz) milk
- 225ml (8fl oz) double cream
- 1 teaspoon vanilla paste, from supermarkets
- 225g (8oz) caster sugar
- 5 eggs, separated
- 140g (5oz) fresh breadcrumbs
- Zest of 2 lemons
- 200g (7oz) cherry compote, from supermarkets

What you do:

Preheat oven to 160°C/fan 140°C/gas 3. Pour the milk and cream into a pan and add the vanilla paste. Bring slowly to the boil over a medium heat and remove. Whisk half the sugar and 5 egg yolks in a bowl until light and creamy. Slowly pour into the hot milk and cream, whisking all the time. Add the breadcrumbs and zest. Soak for 5 minutes. Sit 6 ramekin dishes in a roasting tin and three-quarter fill the ramekins with the pudding mixture. Tap gently to level. Pour boiling water into the tin until it comes halfway up the ramekins. Bake for 10-15 minutes, or until the puddings are almost set and wobbly in the centre. Remove and cool. Turn oven up to 190°C/fan 170°C/gas 5. Place the egg whites in a clean dry bowl and whisk to form stiff peaks. Gradually whisk in the remaining sugar until you get a thick, glossy meringue, then spoon into a piping bag. Spoon the compote onto the cooled ramekins. Pipe the meringue onto the puddings and bake for 6-8 minutes until crisp and lightly browned.

+Recipe - Coconut Party Rings

I picked this up while I was doing my shopping, they would be great for your Street Party.

Makes about 20

What you need:

- 50g (2oz) softened butter
- 50g (2oz) golden castor sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla bean paste or extract
- 100g (3 ½ oz.) plain flour
- 50g (2oz) desiccated coconut
- 1 medium egg

For the icina:

- 300g (10oz) icing sugar
- Food colouring pastes or gels

What you do:

Put the butter, sugar and vanilla in a mixing bowl and beat, using an electric whisk, for about 6-8 minutes, until pale and creamy. Add the flour, coconut, egg and a pinch of salt. Mix for a further 2 minutes, or until a dough forms.

Roll out the dough between 2 sheets of non-stick baking paper to 5mm (1/4 inch thick), chill for 30 minutes.

Preheat the oven to gas mark 4, 180c fan 160c. Using a 5cm (2 inch) cookie cutter, stamp out about 20 rounds, rerolling as required. Using a 2cm (¾ inch) cookie cutter, stamp out the middle of each round to make a ring and discard (or reroll to make more biscuits, if you like).



Arrange the rings on a non-stick baking sheet and bake for 10-12 minutes, or until lightly golden. Leave to cool on the baking sheet for a few minutes, before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

To make the icing, sift the icing sugar into a large bowl and add enough freshly boiled water to produce a thick, spreadable consistency. Divide the icing into separate smaller bowls, adding different food colouring to each, Using a teaspoon, spread each ring with a single colour icing, then drizzle over lines in a contrasting colour. To create a feathered effect, drag a cocktail stick through the icing in 1cm (1/2 inch) intervals. Repeat with the remaining biscuits in different colour pairings. Leave to set on a wire rack before serving.

+Activity – Flowers In Ice

If you want to surprise your guests do not fail to try this. It's amazing how such a simple thing can be so effective.

What you need:

- Ice cube trays
- Small flowers from the garden or you can buy edible flowers too.

What you do:

Place a flower in each cube and fill to the top with water and freeze.





These would be nice with flavoured water too.



How about getting local children involved with your Street Party?

Intergenerational work is becoming a common theme. It's easy to get projects up and running providing you have an idea and some contacts in the local community.

Here are some suggestions to get you started

Reading/Literacy

- Many youngsters need help with reading and literacy, ask at your local
- It works both ways, if you have residents who are blind/partially sighted

about organising a scavenger hunt in your local town/village.

- You could hunt for pieces of nature like pinecones, red flower etc
- You could take an obscure picture of a local landmark and participants need to identify what each picture is.
- Clues and questions to lead you round a route.
- Residents can be partnered up to a family and work together.
- At the end of the hunt celebrate with some smoothies and cake

Toddlers/New Mums

Why not host a toddler group or special event at the care setting, toddlers can help with placing fruit pieces or breadsticks in bowls. Residents can read or sing and dance with the toddlers. Some residents living with dementia will enjoy multisensory games e.g. bubbles, lights, music, tasting sessions just as much as the toddlers will. Mums also benefit from talking with older people who have been in their situation before and learning coping skills.


Skills Exchange

Why not put together a four week course where older people teach youngsters skills for two weeks and youngsters teach older people skills the other two weeks. For example cooking, changing a fuse, sewing, gardening, using a mobile, sending a text, searching the internet.

Community Media

A variety of campaigns can bring older and younger people together. How about exploring radio and video in addition to poster presentations? Topics to get you started: safety on the streets, employment, health, relationships.



+Activity – Furniture Restoration or Upcycling

Old furniture is often available from junk shops for a few pounds; you may be able to get some for FREE if you ask around. You could restore almost anything, chairs, dressers, mirrors, coffee tables, small wooden pieces of furniture the list goes on....

This idea is based around a wooden trinket box.

What you need:

- Different grades of sandpaperA screwdriver to remove the hinge
- 1//24
- Soft cloth

What you do:

- Remove the hinge so you can sand the whole box. Invite a small group of people that are keen, along to help restore the items.
- Ask each person to sand their box the results are instant. The sanding may take a while but it is something that you can do over time, there is no hurry. The idea is for someone to take their time and enjoy the project.

• Once fully sanded the box can then be waxed and the hinge put back on.






+Memory Parlour

- Bringing Stories to Life

Learning about life stories is the foundation to building closer relationships and forming meaningful connections, but how can we provide an environment that allows people to share and explore their lifestories with each other? The Tangible Memories team are pioneering new and exciting ways of using technology to collect, share and celebrate the memories of older people in care.

Tangible Memories is a project that works to build a sense of shared experience through exploration of individual life stories, it seeks to attach stories to meaningful objects so that residents can remind themselves of important memories. These are everyday objects integrated with technology to give the user new ways to collect and share their memories. The project is a collaboration between a team of researchers from the University of Bristol, local artists and Alive!.

Extra Care Estate has been working with Tangible Memories for the last 18 months. They are home to a vibrant group of residents and a progressive, forward thinking team of staff, making Blaise Weston the perfect place to collect life stories. The Tangible Memories team worked with staff, care home residents and families to co-design a space filled with objects that encourages curiosity, sparks questions and offers opportunities for storytelling, connection and contemplation. The team helped to design the space as a community resource which will be used to encourage local schools, community groups to visit and collaborate with older people in that space.

The Memory Parlour has lots of different areas, all with their own appeal; a 1950s style lounge area, a kitchen area with deep enamel sink, a table to sit around, a bench area with rummage boxes themed around the decades, a specially designed and painted map (by artist Simon Tozer) of Bristol and the latest version of the Tangible Memories rocking chair. So there are lots of talking points and things to interact with.

Within just a few minutes of being there, we saw how the space encouraged and enabled people to share stories from their lives. Fred, a resident at Blaise Weston Court, showed us around the map, pointing out items of interest, many of them suggested by residents. We could see the enormous footsteps of the two giants of legend who created the Avon Gorge, for instance. We were intrigued by a man in a little boat down on New Cut, The man is using a punt gun, which Fred said was used for shooting ducks. The ducks would be quietly driven into traps up a creek by the boat to where there was no escape, perhaps that's where the term 'sitting ducks' comes from

Barry, 94, told us that he hopes that people from the local community will come and use the room, particularly local schoolchildren. Barry has seen so much change over his lifetime, and is keen to pass on some of his experience and knowledge to younger generations.

Within just a few minutes of being there, we saw how the space encouraged and enabled people to share stories from their lives.

We left Fred sat in the Tangible Memories rocking chair. Discreet technology means that as you sit in the chair rocking, you can listen to a variety of soundscapes (garden birdsong, the beach, etc) to stimulate memories or just experience something afresh.

The Memory Parlour will be an inspiration for other care settings. Thanks to the imagination and ingenuity of the staff at Blaise Weston Court and the Tangible Memories team of artists and researchers, it provides a wonderful space where residents and people from all parts of the local community can come together to share time, memories and enjoyment. We can't wait for our next visit!
